MANGAN, JAMES T[HOMAS] AN ARCHIVE OF MATERIALS FROM THE MICRONATION OF CELESTIA

- Revised edition of *The Knack of Selling Yourself* (1968) book by James T. Mangan. An unremarkable copy, but fine condition and an interesting companion to the other items.

All items except the photos (with captioned press tags and paste residue) and banking license (with mildly tattered edges and a staple hole) are in fine condition. State of the Sky is unbound with uncut pages. One copy of the Report has a thin red mark on the Space House Boat page. An absolutely unique collection.

This is a collection of papers, pamphlets, and ephemera related to the Nation of Celestial Space, a micronation encompassing the entire universe outside of the planet Earth, founded in 1948 by James T. Mangan (1896-1970).


In addition to being First Representative of Space, Mangan was a prolific self-help author, industrial designer, and public relations pitchman based out of Evergreen Park, IL, a Chicago suburb (and, according to the Celestia documents herein, "capital of the Universe of Space"). Mr. Mangan was a famously colorful personality with a background in advertising who took the management of his nation seriously while never shying away from publicity opportunities. He applied for a seat at the United Nations (application still pending, according to the Celestia website), and the Celestia flag was flown outside the U.N. building for a single day in 1958 (before security took it down and escorted Mr. Mangan from the property). Celestia issued official Passports to the Moon to the select astronauts whom Mr. Mangan liked (including John Glenn, apparently). Mr. Mangan periodically held televised protests against rockets and satellites which were encroaching on his domain. All official papers of independence and sovereignty were properly filed, and a golden currency was minted.

Among the documents printed was the 26-page illustrated pamphlet Report to the Universe, which is the crown jewel of this collection. The pamphlet is a celebration of the 7-year anniversary of Celestia's founding and features reproductions of many of its official papers, as well as other curiosities such as blueprints for a "Space House Boat" and a photo of Mr. Mangan demonstrating the use of "Infinity Space Eye Glasses (reversible)." A follow-up to this, the Second Report to the Universe (1958), was released to the public and is occasionally listed for sale, but this first Report was never distributed. I corresponded with Celestia's current Prime Minister and First Representative Dean Stump, who said he had never seen a copy of the first Report. It is unlikely that additional copies beyond the two sold here remain in existence.

State of the Sky is another illustrated pamphlet which concerns Celestia's conservation efforts and push for international recognition, detailing how the nation "formally and repeatedly informed the State Department of every established nation on earth of its existence, its claims, its rights, its intentions, its nationhood." This pamphlet is extremely uncommon, and we were able to find only a single other copy for sale. Our copy, which was previously owned by First Representative Stump, is an unbound, unopened copy. The large folio sheets are folded but can be taken apart easily if one wishes to read the contents.

The official Passport to the Moon included with this collection is not filled out with an astronaut's name, but it does certify the bearer as a "Celestial Participant." Sadly, the Passport expired in 1975 and can no longer be used as a valid travel document. Passports to the Moon are very rare, and no others are currently listed for sale.

You Ought to Know is a promotional pamphlet for Mangan's Chicago advertising agency, Mangan and Eckland, reprinted from a flattering profile of Mangan from Advertising Age magazine in 1947, the year before he founded Celestia. An interesting biographical sketch of the accomplished self-promoter.








The press photos (both with caption tags pasted to versos) document two moments in Mangan's pre- and post-Celestia careers. The first, from 1931, shows a young Mr. Mangan receiving an elaborate display of flowers for his past work as American Legion commander. The second, from 1949, shows a worldlier Mangan being presented with the deed to "all outer space."

A very charming facsimile letter from legendary astronaut John Glenn, sent to the Mangans in 1962, reads: "Thank you for your check covering the cost of unlimited Christmas joy and a New Year full of dollars... Also thank you for the passport to the moon. Looks like I'm all set now."

This is a collection of documents by a man with a sense of humor and a bone-deep knack for public relations. Though Mr. Mangan passed away in 1975, Celestia remains a fully functioning micronation, governed today by Mangan's descendants with titles like Duke of Alpha Centauri and Duchess of Mars. But Celestia has never been a joke, and though plenty of fun has been had, it remains a nation with a purpose. In Mr. Mangan's many public appearances, he never failed to mention Celestia's mission of peace and conservation, barring all rockets from space and taking legal action against hostile nations who wanted to send war machines through his legal property. "The basic philosophy of the Nation of Celestial Space," states the banking license included here, "is contained in one word: Magnanimity. By achieving bigness of mind, [Mangan] insists the peoples of the world can find lasting peace. Celestia is the answer."

[CRANE, STEPHEN]; [HUBBARD, ELBERT]; [ROYCROFT] HANDWRITTEN LETTERS FROM STEPHEN CRANE TO ELBERT HUBBARD AND RELATED EPHEMERA

This is a unique collection of paper ephemera regarding an 1895 celebratory dinner honoring Stephen Crane, whose The Red Badge of Courage was at the time a modest success in its second printing. The event was hosted by Elbert Hubbard, the influential publisher, editor, and founder of the Roycroft arts and crafts community. These items belonged to Edith Maclure Love, a friend of both Stephen Crane and Elbert Hubbard.

The following items are included in this sale:


- Two handwritten letters from Stephen Crane to Elbert Hubbard, both signed
- Program and menu from an event by The Society of the Philistines honoring Mr. Crane, December 19, 1895
- First issue of Roycroft Quarterly magazine featuring a medley of Crane's works, a souvenir of the dinner

The two brief letters are written from Hartwood, N.Y. and dated Dec. 5th and Jan. 28. The year is not stated but 1895/96 is very likely. The first letter references Mr. Crane traveling to Buffalo for the upcoming dinner in his honor on Dec. 19, 1895. It is written on a leaf of hand-pressed paper and signed "Yours sincerely, Stephen Crane." The second letter, written several weeks after the dinner, references a work which Mr. Crane states is "the only one of my productions which I ecstatically admire." This likely refers to Hubbard's essay "As to the Man" (see below). This letter is written on a leaf of ruled paper and signed "Yours, C."

The dinner program is a folded, string-bound 8 pp. pamphlet titled "The Society of the Philistines / Thursday Evening / December Nineteenth, 1895 / In Honor of Mr. Stephen Crane." The front page is a menu for the evening's meal, and on the verso is the text from Mr. Crane's poem "I have heard the sunset song of the birches," which was as yet unpublished at the time. The following page features a large woodcut illustration with a Lewis Carroll quote, which is the same illustration on the cover of the Roycroft Quarterly included here. The remainder of the program features diver quips praising Crane from eminent people of arts and letters who were invited to the event but could not attend, including Richard Harding Davis, Edward Bok, Ambrose Bierce, and many others. The program is in good condition, though the string binding is tender and is beginning to tear through the pages. The pages were once folded along the horizontal axis, and they have a prominent crease across the center and a 1" closed tear at fore edge where the paper was folded. This item is quite uncommon in the trade. (BAL 4072)

The Roycroft Quarterly is the first (and evidently only) published issue, "being a goodly collection of literary curiosites obtained from sources not easily accessible to the average book-lover." The issue's full title is "A Souvenir and a Medley: Seven Poems and a Sketch by Stephen Crane. With Divers and Sundry Communications from Certain Eminent Wits." According to Hubbard's (tongue-in-cheek) foreward, the Philistine's dinner celebrating Crane (see the program description) was likely what catapulted the young author to success. This magazine reprints the diver quotes and includes new material, including a long essay by Hubbard titled "As to the Man." The publication is a 48 pp. 12mo in publisher's staple-bound wraps with the same woodblock illustration on front cover as was previously featured in the dinner program, and is in good condition overall. The rear wrapper is missing, and there are several closed tears around the wrapper edges. Mrs. Maclure, the previous owner, has signed the top of the front wrapper. A different hand has written "pages 16 + 17" on the front wrapper (we have some documents with Elbert Hubbard's handwriting, and this seems to be his writing, but it is not confirmed). Pp. 16 and 17 features the beginning of the "As to the Man" essay and have a red, curved mark on them. It seems likely that this is the production which Mr. Crane ecstacitally admires (referenced in his letter) -- based on the notations and the fact that the letter was inserted between these pages when we received them -- but again, that is speculation. The journal is otherwise tight and clean. The rear endpaper features an ad for The Philistine, another Roycroft publication, which hosted the dinner. (BAL 4074).




Presentation copy. Inscribed on 2nd free endpaper to Edith Maclure Love. 3/4" scratch on front board and several other minor dents due to shelf wear. 1" damp stain on rear cloth. Tight and clean, an excellent copy. Includes a lock of hair.

This is a presentation copy of Elbert Hubbard's biography of naturalist Burroughs. Of particular note is the inscription to Mrs. Love and the lock of hair which is included. According to her grandson, this lock of hair was Elbert Hubbard's and was mailed to Mrs. Love inside the book. The hair is light brown and wavy, as was Hubbard's, but we are not able to DNA test the hair or verify the claim. Based on the other material in the estate, this bookseller believes it is likely that the hair is authentically Hubbard's, but there is no concrete proof. Regardless, this uncommon Roycrofters book with presentation signature is a highly collectible item in excellent condition. Very good.



East Aurora, NY: Roycrofters, 1897. Boards. 8vo, Red quarter cloth over boards. Hand-pressed paper with untrimmed edges. Title page on Japan paper tipped in. Hand-illuminated initials throughout and 3 hand-painted watercolor flowers. 62 pp. Presentation copy. Hand-numbered and initialed by Hubbard on colophon, followed by a separate gift inscription to E.M. Love, who was Edith Maclure Love, a friend to Hubbard, Stephen Crane, and Walt Whitman.

Minor shelf wear, with some rubbing to edges and some scuffs to spine pastedown. A few scuffs to boards and some darkening from sunning.

This is a very scarce book of naturalist essays by environmentalist and journalist Knapp, published by Elbert Hubbard and Roycrofters. It is a limited edition (numbered 281 of 600) initialed, signed, and inscribed by Hubbard. The hand-illuminations and watercolor flowers throughout are bright and crisp, and they are unique from copy to copy. An excellent example of Roycroft craftsmanship and attention to detail. Very good.

SEGAL, RALPH H. BODYSCOPE

New York: Bodyscope Publications, 1933. First Edition. Wraps. Very large folio. 20"x16". Wraps. 2 double-sided, full color anatomical panels with rotating volvelle wheels inside. Rotating the wheels shows different body systems and text through the multiple windows in the panels.

Split at spine, so book is in 4 separate pieces. Wrap edges quite worn with many closed tears and a 2" chip at bottom edge. Panels also have tears, including a taped closed tear that spans horizontally halfway across the "male body" panel. Despite tears, book is complete and intact and wheels turn normally. This is a very uncommon educational tool which teaches the basics of anatomy and physiology with rotating wheels of colorful images and text. Quite a curiosity. Fair. Item #1972 Price: \$500.00

LINWEAVE PAPER CO. THE LINWEAVE TAROT PACK

New York: Brown Company, 1967. 8.5"x6" box containing 42 tarot cards, an instructional foldout, a 4 pp. pamphlet on the history of the tarot, and a blank comment card. All pieces are finely printed on cardstock of varying weights, textures, and colors. Minor bumping to box corners. Box is near fine and contents are fine. This is a very uncommon tarot deck printed as a promotion for the Linweave Paper Company. Each card showcases a different paper style from the company's catalog. The recto of the card bears the illustration (most in color), while the verso showcases the meaning of the card, the artist, and the paper type. All of the art was commissioned by contemporary artists Ron Rae, Hy Roth, Nicolas Sidjakov, and David Mario Palladini specifically for this project, giving the deck something of a groovy, Yellow Submarine appearance. An excellent piece.




[MANNING, WARREN H.] [LANDSCAPE ARCHITECTURE] WARREN H. MANNING'S SOUVENIRS FROM PARIS, 1899

This is a lot of four Parisian souvenirs which belonged to (and bear the authentic bookplate of) influential American landscape designer Warren H. Manning (1860-1938). Mr. Manning is best remembered as the pioneering voice behind the "wild garden" movement, which emphasized cultivating pre-existing plants and natural landscaping, rather than the formal, symmetrical gardens of imported plants which were popular at the time. In addition to the many parks he designed in his lifetime, Mr. Manning's contributions ranged from founding the American Civic Association and the American Society of Landscape Architects to spearheading national conservation efforts which eventually led to the American National and State Forest and Park systems.

We are presenting four souvenirs from an 1899 visit to Paris - 3 small illustrated books of architecture and a set of 19 photographic cards. The 3 books bear Mr. Manning's bookplate, and the cards each have handwritten notes in French on the backs identifying the subjects. Two of the books also bear the signature of Daniel Ford Pratt, who was Mr. Manning's father-in-law. As all the items are related to Mr. Manning's architectural field (with the cards specifically focusing on landscapes and gardens), it is not a stretch to speculate that Mr. Manning may have gleaned some inspiration for his future achievements from this visit.

MORRIS, EFFIE LEE [SIGNED]; SASEK, MIROSLAV SEE THE CITY! A BEGINNER'S GUIDE TO SAN FRANCISCO

American Library Association, 1967. First Edition, First Printing. Pamphlet.

This is a rare pamphlet cowritten by activist librarian Morris and legendary Czech illustrator Sasek, inscribed by Morris inside front cover. Adapted from Sasek's *This Is San Francisco* picture book, this pamphlet was given to attendees of the American Library Association conference of 1967 in San Francisco. Morris was evidently in attendance of the conference, as her inscription references "warmest memories of ALA." At the time of this listing, there were no other copies of this available for sale online.

Of the two contributors, Sasek was the more known as an award-winning illustrator of the "This Is..." series of picture books about cities around the world. Morris was a very influential librarian and educator best known for her advocacy work in children's literature. She helped establish the Coretta Scott King Award and was its first chairperson. Morris was also an influential civil rights activist.

This one-of-a-kind signed pamphlet would make a fine addition to any collection of Sasek's books, children's literature, library history, or civil rights ephemera. Fine. Item #623

[MOTHERSBAUGH, MARK] [DEVO] BOOJI BOY MY STRUGGLE

Cleveland, OH: Neo Rubber Band, 1978. First Edition, First Printing. Wraps. 12mo. Red leatherette wraps. Mimeographed pages. Many illustrations and collages throughout. 280 pp.

Covers are quite worn. Large vertical crease on both covers. Scuffing to all edges, with the leatherette chipped away at corners. 3/4" circular stain on front cover, bottom left. Dark scuff on bottom block edge. Interior is excellent, with only a crease on p. -11.

Note that the pages are bound unusually far into the margin, which makes the book feel as if it can only be opened about 3/4 of the way (which accounts for the creases on covers). This is a binding error on the part of the printer (which is to say, Mothersbaugh) that was corrected in later printings, indicating that this copy was put together very early in the process.


This is a very scarce first printing of Mark Mothersbaugh's My Struggle, a satirical "little red book" written incharacter as Devo's mascot, Booji Boy. The book was written, illustrated, collaged, printed, bound, and self-published by Mothersbaugh and an associate ("RJS"). There are several variant bindings of the first printing which indicate (confusingly) both the printing order and which person bound that copy. According to an excerpt by "RJS" from the fan website Devo Obsesso:


"The first edition had both red & yellow leatherette covers because i ran out of the red, which was the original plan. I printed the pages 4 up on 81/2 x 11 paper on my multilith 850 and used a borrowed paper cutter to quarter them....i delivered half of the printing of 700 copies unassembled to Mark; the ones I did were put together with beehive frame nails bent over, which i assembled...i dont know how Mark assembed his half of the first printing... A substantial number of the ones i assembled have a red ribbon glued into the spine, to be used like a prayerbook marker." This seems to be one of the Mothersbaugh copies, as it lacks the beehive nails and prayer ribbon. Later reprints, which are also guite scarce, have the title stamped on the cover, and some have an additional intro page and a "This Book Belongs To" stamp, none of which are present in this copy.

Overall, a very scarce early printing of a very scarce book in a sadly battered exterior. Highly collectible for Devo fans or collectors of alternative music memorabilia. Good +.





Small scuff mark on front cover. Inscribed pastedown added to front free endpaper. Pastedown has a large tear down the center crease. Soiled hinges at endpapers. Pencil note p. 63 ("Rely on god within"). Discoloration bottom right corner of pp. 93–97. Pen underlining p. 94 (about harnessing the artistic force of the universe). Pamphlet laid in. Otherwise clean.

This is a scarce self-published text inscribed by S.R. Parchment, the occultist founder of the Rosicrucian Anthroposophical League. The following is inscribed on the front pastedown diagram: "You contain within yourself that transforming agency by which you can make of yourself what you will. SR Parchment, Sept 13th, 1935." Laid in is a 6.5"x3.5" pamphlet advertising a lecture series by Parchment at Chicago's Great Northern Hotel, presumably where the book was inscribed. A unique copy of this rare and fascinating Rosicrucian handbook. Very good.

STOW, MRS. J.W. [MARIETTA LOIS BEERS STOW] UNJUST LAWS WHICH GOVERN WOMAN. PROBATE CONFISCATION

Engraved frontispiece with tissue guard. 381, [1], 34 pp. Edges lightly rubbed. Minor foxing and soiling to front matter. Tight and clean, an excellent copy.

This is an early printing of an important feminist/suffragist text by American activist and politician Stow. This was her first and most popular book, a treatise nominally about corrupt probate law ("which deserves to be placed on a level with the plagues of Egypt") and more about a woman's role in society in general. Stow was heavily involved in California politics and was the first female Vice-Presidential candidate, running in 1884 on a ticket with Belva Ann Lockwood for the National Equal Rights Party. This book, self-published in 1876, is an excellent example of the righteous, fiery rhetoric for which Stow became famous: "In every chapter I have endeavored to show the bastard power of moneyed might and sex-might over right, and the unjust and cruel laws made by man for the subjugation of woman." Very good.

[CHICAGO PUBLIC SCHOOLS] 1911 PHYSICS TABLET BY A CHICAGO HIGH SCHOOL STUDENT

Notes in Physics; For the Use of the Pupils of the Richard T. Crane Technical High School. Chicago: Fred R. Nichols, 1910. Boards, 8vo. Quarter cloth boards tied with brown string. Pastedown on front cover. Mixed pagination. Significant rubbing to boards. As this is a high school tablet, many of the pages consist of handwritten notes. Pen notations throughout. Signed by author and owner. Loose ephemera including notes and a photograph laid in. This is a textbook and tablet for a high school physics class, used in the 1911-1912 school year. The class was taught by the author of this and several other physics textbooks, Professor Fred R. Nichols, alongside instructor F.C. Donecker. The tablet belonged to H.C. Johnsen who lived in what is now the Wicker Park neighborhood of Chicago. The tablet was issued to students of the R.T. Crane Technical High School in the East Garfield Park neighborhood, which still exists as the Richard T. Crane Medical Prep High School.

This text is a fascinating glimpse into the life of a turn-of-the-century Chicago high school student. The first portion of the tablet is a printed textbook followed by several hundred pages of hand-written notes and exercises as well as hand-drawn diagrams. Mr. Johnsen seems to have been quite studious, as there are minimal deviations from physics assignments present, though there are a few marginal doodles and a family portrait photograph labelled "The Johnsens" laid in. There are several instances of corrections and notes from the instructor, as well as official stamps indicating that the student had permission to use black ink instead of violet. Mr. Johnsen attained the grade of "Good" for the year, so well done Mr. Johnsen. Very good.

The late James M. Wells was the legendary curator and head of acquisitions for the Newberry Library and custodian of the John M. Wing Foundation on the History of Printing. He held this position for 34 years until his retirement in 1984. His successor, and this book's recipient, was Curator Emeritus Paul Gehl, a historian and curator of great renown who held Wells' position until his retirement in 2016. This unique copy of Wells' gorgeous exhibition catalog celebrating the impact of the Encyclopaedia Britannica on the world of education also represents the passing of a torch from one world-class scholar to another. ARMSTRONG, HON. PERRY A. THE SAUKS AND THE BLACK HAWK WAR, WITH BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCHES, ETC.

Ex-library, with sticker on spine, library bookplate inside front cover, card pocket pasted onto first free endpaper, and embossed stamp on title page and p.726. Front hinge splitting at top, threatening to detach. Both hinges overopened. Title page has been reattached by a previous owner, and tape residue is present, as well as on frontispiece. Pages are very clean, and binding is tight except for front hinge.

This is a first edition history of the brief war between the Sauk nation (led by Black Hawk) and the US military. Black Hawk's defeat functionally marked the end of Native armed resistance to US expansion, and remains a major event in Illinois history. The Chicago NHL team, the Blackhawks, are named after the Sauk leader. Includes a full muster roll of Illinois volunteers. The title page lists the city of publication as "Splingfield," which we presume to be an adorable misprint. (Wikipedia). Fair.





This is the first edition of the first volume of a seminal text of Western American history. William Hemsley Emory was the civil engineer and surveyor tasked with mapping the new border between the US and Mexico following the Mexican-American War, in which the US had acquired the New Mexico, Arizona, and Southern California territories. Emory's survey was famously thorough, including illustrations of biological and geological discoveries, anthropological studies of the Mexican and Native American populations, and landscape illustrations showing various views across the border from many locations and perspectives. Emory would later serve as a colonel in the Union army of the American Civil War. The relationships that Emory forged with Native American tribesmen during his survey, particularly his alliance with Black Beaver of the Lenape people, were instrumental in securing Union victories in Oklahoma and Kansas.

Emory's survey is an important document of the geology, botany, and anthropology of the mid-19th century American Southwest, generally agreed to be the most thorough of its kind. Many prominent scientists of the era contributed to the report, including botanist Charles C. Parry, artist/ethnographer Arthur Carl Victor Schott (whose color lithograph portraits are a high point of this volume), and geologist/paleontologist James Hall. Two additional volumes were printed, though not widely distributed. This hefty volume is a treasure not only of data, but of some of the most detailed, precise, and evocative landscape and portrait illustrations that this bookseller has encountered. An important book for any collector of Western Americana, scarce in this condition.

This is the first edition of a significant contribution to American ethnography. Latrobe (1801-1875; technically "La Trobe") was something of a Renaissance man, described by his friend Washington Irving as "a man of a thousand occupations; a botanist, a geologist, a hunter of beetles and butterflies, a musical amateur, sketcher of no mean pretensions. a very indefatigable, if not always a very successful, sportsman." Later, "beloved governor of the Australian territory Victoria" would be added to his list of accolades. This book was written during an 1834 trip to the American West and prairie territories with Irving, to whom the work is dedicated. The result is Latrobe's best-known book, a highly readable (and rather tongue-in-cheek) portrait of life on the frontier and in the indigenous communities. 



This work ranks with Smith's Virginia and Hutchinson's Massachusetts, as one of the worthiest examples of historical literature produced in later colonial times." Book is very good and jacket is good. Cloth has speckles and stains around the edges. Rectangular discoloration inside front endpapers, which appears to be offsetting from something previously laid inside. Otherwise, interior is perfect. Jacket is unclipped. Speckling along right edge of front jacket cover and top 1/3 of rear jacket cover. Sunning to spine. 1/2" chip just above author's name on jacket spine. Several other closed tears along edges of jacket spine, as well as chips along top edge. This is a first printing of Virginia Woolf's classic book-length essay. Quite scarce in dust jacket. Very good / good.
